

**MAG Regional Domestic Violence Council
Proposed Goals for FY 2011**

- 1) Coordinate services to meet the transportation needs of domestic violence survivors. This will result in improved access to shelter, employment, and work preparation activities. Research will be completed in the first quarter of FY 2011 resulting in at least two recommendations being developed and presented to the MAG Regional Domestic Violence Council by the second quarter of FY 2011.
- 2) Evaluate the protocols used to arrest and prosecute domestic violence offenders. The evaluation will include an assessment of promising practices in the first quarter of FY 2011, identification of suggested revisions to the current protocols and policies in the second quarter of FY 2011, and training on suggested improvements in the third quarter of FY 2011. This will create greater efficiency and effectiveness, resulting in cost savings for the municipal criminal justice systems, increased safety for domestic violence victims, and more accountability for offenders. The MAG Regional Domestic Violence Council will evaluate the success of the effort in the fourth quarter of FY 2011.
- 3) Coordinate activities with community partners such as municipal fatality review teams and domestic violence commissions, the Arizona Coalition Against Domestic Violence, the Purple Ribbon Council, Friends of O'Connor House, and others to maximize the region's capacity to address domestic violence. This will be documented in FY 2011 through support of collaborative projects as presented to the MAG Regional Domestic Violence Council.
- 4) Implement the FY 2011 MAG Regional Plan to End Domestic Violence. Complete at least one action step identified in the goal by collaborating with the MAG Regional Domestic Violence Council and community partners. Document and offer a report on progress made on the plan by the fourth quarter of FY 2011 to the Domestic Violence Council.
- 5) Support activities to assess the benefits and potential burden of transportation projects on domestic violence survivors that belong to populations covered by Title VI, Environmental Justice throughout FY 2011. The intent of environmental justice (EJ) is to ensure that communities of concern, defined as minority populations, low income populations, aged populations, mobility disabled populations, and female head of household populations have a voice in the transportation planning process and receive a proportionate share of the benefits.
