1. Call to Order
Chairman Kerry Wilcoxon called the meeting to order at 10:03 AM
2. Approval of October 28, 2008 Meeting Minutes
Margaret Boone-Pixley moved and Julian Dresang seconded and it was unanimously carried to approve the minutes of the meeting held on January 27, 2009.
3. Call to Audience
Chairman Kerry Wilcoxon made a call to the audience providing an opportunity to members

of the public to address the Transportation Safety Committee. No public comments were received.

4. Program Manager's Report

Sarath Joshua reported on the following items:

- 2009 Safe Routes to School Grants administered by Arizona DOT has resulted in the following grants to agencies/projects from this region:
 - **Infrastructure**
 - City of Phoenix – for new sidewalks at Mitchell School in support of their Safe Routes To School Program
 - City of Phoenix - Safe Crossing To School
 - **Non Infrastructure**
 - Town of Gilbert - 5Es Stabilization Project
 - Phoenix Children's Hospital (PCH) - Creighton School District SRTS Program
 - Maricopa Department of Public Health (MCDPH) -Walk-n-Rollers
 - Deer Valley Unified School District (DVUSD) /City of Peoria - Walk and Bike to School Encouragement Programs, Phase 3
 - Apache Junction Safe and Fit
 - **Materials & Regional Support Program**
 - MAG – For Safety Kits to be provided to each participating school crossing guard at the annual Regional Crossing Guard Training Workshop
- Regional Transportation Safety Information Management System
Sarath Joshua reported that Kimley-Horn and Associates has submitted a fee proposal for the next phase of this project. A task order is being processed and will be sent out shortly. Pradeep Tiwari from ADOT asked whether the RTSIMS would overlap with ADOT's Safety Data Mart application. Sarath Joshua explained that, based on what he knows about the ADOT system, the RTSIMS when fully developed will have more of the desired functionality than the system currently being developed by ADOT. Chris Plumb asked if MAG is planning on checking and correcting the errors in the crash database due to inaccurate reporting. Sarath Joshua replied that none of the ALISS crash data will be modified at MAG, and that the responsibility for any corrections or revisions to ALISS data would stay with ADOT.
- ALISS Crash Database
ADOT ALISS Crash Database has undergone some changes. All reported crashes are now supposed to be recorded using a new Crash Report Form. This change became effective on January 1, 2009. ADOT has developed a system that allows any local agency to retrieve their crash data, provided the local agency has executed a Data Access Agreement with ADOT. This agreement will also allow local enforcement agencies to electronically transfer crash data to ADOT to be entered in ALISS.

5. Safety and Elderly Mobility Sign Project

Maureen DeCindis from MAG reported to the committee that \$75,613 was remaining from the \$400,000 Safety and Elderly Mobility Sign project as the City of Phoenix could not spend their share of money. Committee members discussed priorities for distributing these funds. A tentative list of priorities for distributing these funds were listed in Attachment One. One addition to this list was made based on a request for reimbursement made to the committee by Margeret Boone-Pixley of Avondale, for \$700 for a cost overrun and \$1,000 for additional signs.

Priority #1: City of Phoenix Request for \$25,000,
Priority #2: Reimburse cost overruns
Priority #3: New Signs.

John Abraham moved, Julian Dresang seconded and it was unanimously carried to recommend approval of the following distribution for remainder of project funds:

Priority#1: City of Phoenix - \$25,000
Priority#2: Reimburse cost overruns reported to MAG (total \$17,998):
City of Surprise - \$5,552
City of Litchfield Park - \$ 1,624
City of Tolleson - \$1,309
City of Mesa - \$9,513
City of Avondale - \$1,700 (includes \$1,000 for additional signs)

The remaining \$30,915 is to be equally divided among Tempe, Mesa and Surprise.

6. Evaluation of Safety and Elderly Mobility Sign Project
Sarath Joshua reported to the committee Arizona State University was recently hired through the on-call contract to perform an evaluation of the safety impact of the Elderly Mobility Sign Project. He introduced Dr. Robert Gray from Arizona State University who was attending the meeting and also stated that Dr. Simon Washington, Dr. Robert Gray and Jothan Samuelson will be the team performing the evaluation. Dr. Gray was invited to speak to the committee on the project and he briefed the committee on the study objectives, analysis methodology, subject recruitment plan and planned schedule. He also explained constraints of other evaluation methodologies and advantages of using a driver simulator over other methodologies.
7. Safety Measures for MAG Performance Measurement and Congestion Management Study
The committee members were briefed by Sarath Joshua on a MAG project that is developing a Framework for Performance Measurement and a Congestion Management Process for the region. Monique de los Rios-Urban from MAG provided an overview of the MAG project. She highlighted the Proposition 400 and SAFETEA-LU requirements for performance monitoring. She described the various measures that will be used to measure system

performance. She described the tentative list of safety performance measures, that has been generated in consultation with MAG staff and committee members. She requested the committees review and action to recommend a list of measures that could be used to report on Safety Performance. The committee fully supported the idea of including road safety in future systemwide reports on performance measurement.

Chris Plumb moved and Margaret Boone-Pixley seconded and it was unanimously carried to recommend inclusion of the following road safety measures as part of the MAG Performance Measurement Study:

- Annual Trend of All Crashes, Injury Crashes, Fatal Crashes, Injuries, Fatalities (2005- 2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Pedestrian Crashes - All Crashes, Injury Crashes, Fatal Crashes, Injuries, Fatalities (2005- 2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Pedestrian Injuries + Fatalities per 100K Population in Each MAG Jurisdiction (2007, OR most recent year of crash data)
- Bicyclist Crashes - All Crashes, Injury Crashes, Fatal Crashes, Injuries, Fatalities (2005- 2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Severe Bicyclist Crashes (Injuries + Fatalities) per 100K Population in each MAG Jurisdiction (2007, OR most recent year of crash data)
- Freeway Crashes: Annual Crash Frequency by Severity (injuries, fatalities) for each Freeway Corridor (2005- 2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Freeway Crash Rates, Injury Rates, Fatality Rates by Freeway Corridor(2005- 2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Truck Related All Crashes on Freeways (annual frequency only): Injury Crashes, Fatal Crashes by Freeway Corridor(2005- 2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Truck Related Crashes on Arterials and Local Roads (annual frequency only), All Crashes, Injury Crashes, Fatal Crashes on All Arterial and Local Roads (2005-2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)
- Top 25 High Crash Risk Intersections (2005-2007, OR most recent 3-years of crash data)

The ranking of the Top 25 High Crash Risk Intersections will be generated by applying the following crash severity weighting scheme that is based on the costs attributed to various crash severities by FHWA and ADOT:

Fatal = 1450

Incapacitating Injury = 100

Non-Incapacitating Injury = 20

Possible Injury = 11

No Injury = 1.

8. Availability of Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Funds

In introducing this topic Sarath Joshua explained that in August 2008, Arizona DOT announced a new approach for the distribution of road safety funds that would seem to better distribute available road safety funds across the state. This change in effect terminated the

previous HES application process. Due to staff changes at ADOT, the process has not been finalized or announced to MPOs and COGs. Reed Henry in an email sent to Sarah Joshua explained that he was working with John Dickson and MPD to develop letters to each MPO/COG requesting that they add HSIP funds to their TIP. The letters would specifically identify how much the MPO/COG should place in their TIP (\$1,000,000 for MAG, \$750,000 for PAG and \$600,000 for the rest of the MPOs/COGs) with specific disclaimers if the new Federal Transportation Act changes the HSIP program. The letter would need to come from the MPD Director. He also stated that ADOT would not accept any new HES or HSIP safety project applications for future fiscal years until the new process is in place.

9. Reports by the Committee Members on Transportation Safety Activities

Pradeep Tiwari from ADOT reported that he is working with Safety Analyst. He told that it is a comprehensive suite with network screening, diagnose, select counter measures and evaluate the effectiveness of the countermeasures on the system. Chris Plumb from MCDOT reported that MCDOT is working on generating annual report on crash data for the unincorporated areas. He also said that they are planning on doing a RSA for a county island near North East Mesa between Sossman to Meridian, along Apache Trail. Shane Kiesow from Apache Junction reported that they are auditing all their school zones for signage and other traffic control devices. He said that they are trying to be proactive in improving safety around schools. George Williams from Scottsdale reported that they are working on generating Safety Report for Scottsdale using 2008 crash data. Sarah Joshua reported that MAG is partnering with member agencies and AAA Arizona and hosting Regional Crossing Guard Training Workshops for the fourth consecutive year. These workshops will be held on July 30, 2009 in Peoria and on August 6, 2009 in Mesa.

10. Next Meeting

The next Transportation Safety Committee meeting is scheduled to be held on July 28, 2009 at 10:00AM in the Cholla Room at MAG.

11. Adjournment

Chairman Kerry Wilcoxon adjourned the meeting at 12:05 PM.
