7. Consideration of Mid-Decade Population Estimates

Each year the MAG Population Technical Advisory Committee (POPTAC) reviews and recommends the methodology and jurisdiction population estimates which are used for setting municipal expenditure limits for home rule jurisdictions and calculating MAG dues. MAG POPTAC also has had a role in assisting with the preparation of the decennial count and developing public outreach while serving as a liaison between the US Census Bureau and the MAG member agencies.

In past years, MAG has engaged the MAG member agencies in conducting a mid-decade census count or survey. In May 2011 and October 2012, POPTAC discussed the advisability of conducting a mid-decade census or survey. Previously, a mid-decade census was pursued due to state shared revenue being distributed to the incorporated cities and towns based upon the resident population number from the decennial census. In the past, state statute has been amended to adjust the population numbers to reflect a mid-decade estimate. MAG staff has been in discussion with staff from the League of Arizona Cities and Towns as their membership considers mid-decade population estimates.

MAG staff has conducted a preliminary analysis of population growth between 2010 and 2013 utilizing the State and MAG July 1 Population Estimates. This analysis has been shared with MAG Intergovernmental Representatives. MAG staff will present and discuss the analysis.

8. Employer Database Analysis

MAG Staff have recently completed the annual update to the MAG Employer Database. The 2013 MAG Employer Database contains over

445,000 records of employers in the region that have 5 or more employees. An overview of this year's database will be provided.

9. MAG Online Data Tools Training

On Friday, July 25, 2014 MAG Staff will be conducting a hands-on training workshop in the use of our online data tools. The training will be focused on specific uses for the variety of socioeconomic data that MAG has made available online. An update will be provided.

10. Data Collection and Review

Ongoing data collection efforts include land use information such as General Plan amendments and development projects. The land use data collected are used in preparing socioeconomic projections and conducting regional analyses. An update will be given regarding current data collection efforts. A schedule for the collection of data for the next six months is included in **Attachment Eight**.

11. POPTAC Vice Chair Appointment

The MAG Committee Operating Policies and Procedures were approved by the MAG Regional Council on July 22, 2009. On January 25, 2012, the Regional Council approved updating the Policies and Procedures, Section 5.05 - Terms of Officers, to two-year terms for the technical and other policy committees. The current POPTAC Vice Chair has resigned his position.

According to the MAG Committee Operating Policies and Procedures, a new Vice Chair will be appointed to fill the remainder of the current term. Those members interested in the vice chair position will submit letters of interest to the MAG Regional Council Chair by Tuesday July 15, 2014. 1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 10:05 a.m. by Chair Patrick Banger.

2. Call to the Audience

There were no comments from the audience.

3. Approval of the Meeting Minutes of January 28, 2014

Chris DePerro made a motion to approve the minutes of January 28, 2014. Thomas Doyle seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

4. Mesa General Plan Update

John Wesley gave a presentation about the update to the Mesa General Plan. He said that the city is in the final stages of the update process. He gave an overview of the draft General Plan.

Thomas Ritz asked why the Chapter 5 jobs illustration doesn't show the entire future light rail corridor. John Wesley said that there likely won't be as much of an employment area approaching the Superstition area. He said there won't be as high of economic activity as compared to others. Wahid Alam added that currently a rider can get off the light rail at the end of the line at Sycamore and take the bus out to the mall at Power Road. David de la Torre asked to clarify if the Character Map takes the place of or replaces the land use map. John Wesley said that is correct.

## 5. Online Map Viewer Enhancements

Jason Howard discussed recent enhancements to the online map viewers. He said that the enhancements to the demographic viewer have been well-received, and that similar enhancements are being implemented to some of the other viewers. He asked for feedback on the enhanced viewers from the POPTAC members. He said the land use viewer is the second-most popular viewer, after the demographic viewer. He said that staff is looking at adding more information to the land use viewer, such as development outlines, developability of land, and region-wide general plan data. He said there is also an employment viewer. He said staff doesn't know what direction to take the employment viewer in, and asked for feedback from the members. He said that employment data is currently only at block group level, aggregated from the MAG Employer Database. He said that staff was considering using job centers and providing related reports, based on the live/work maps. He said that in the near future there will be training offered on the MAG viewers and data websites. He discussed future viewer enhancements that will arrive further down the road, including the ability of the user to add map frames to view up to four different layers at once.

Thomas Ritz asked if POPTAC members could be notified when new data is added to the viewers. Jason Howard said that could be done.

Chris DePerro asked who will be able to attend the training, and how will people be invited. Jason Howard said that staff will likely collect potential invitees from POPTAC members and other interested parties.

Wahid Alam asked if it would be possible to take the job centers from each city's general plan and include those in the employment viewer. Jason Howard said that staff can explore any kind of analysis that is desired by the members. He said that ideally the job centers should match the job centers in the general plans, but if they don't staff will be conducting a review of those boundaries in the near future.

Travis Ashbaugh asked if the viewers include Pinal County. Jason Howard said that the demographic viewer includes all of Pinal County. He said that the land use viewer and employment viewer would need to get data from Central Arizona Governments (CAG), and that agreement hasn't been fully worked out yet. He said that MAG would like to include that data in the future.

## 6. Regional Economic Update

Lora Mwaniki-Lyman gave a regional economic update. She looked at macroeconomic indicators and global economy. She said that overall the global economy is strong. She said that

the growth of emerging economies provides opportunities for growth in Arizona exports. She discussed monetary and fiscal policies. She talked about job recovery, and the declining unemployment rate in the local market. She said that, while the unemployment rate has declined, the labor participation rate has also gone down. She talked about the slow recovery of construction jobs in the region. She discussed the real estate market and the recent increase in home prices. She said that overall she is very happy about this year based on the economic indicators.

#### 7. MAG Data Training Opportunities

Jami Garrison discussed training opportunities at MAG. She said that the Census Bureau gave a training session on getting data from their website back in February. She said that MAG has reserved a training room on the 6<sup>th</sup> floor for a few dates later in the year, and will be sending out information on those training opportunities later. She asked members to tell staff if there are any topics they would like to see at a training session.

#### 8. Solar Ready II

Scott Wilken gave an update on the MAG Solar Ready II project. He said that a Solar Ready Stakeholder Group met in February, and helped identify three best management practices (BMPs) for implementation in the region. He said the three main BMPs that were selected were streamlined solar permitting process, solar ready guidelines in building codes, and standardization of fees for solar. He said that in the next few months, staff will begin working with the member agencies to implement those BMPs. He said that another topic that will be discussed is resources for local lenders, and that a training session will be held later in the year for local lenders to familiarize them more with solar financing practices.

Wahid Alam asked if there was discussion of solar ready houses. Scott Wilken said that that will be discussed with the building officials.

#### 9. Data Collection and Review

Jason Howard gave an update on the upcoming data collection and review activities, and thanked the POPTAC members for their help reviewing datasets earlier in the year.

Thomas Ritz asked about the Census 2013 estimates, which are higher than the state or MAG estimates. He asked if MAG had analyzed this to see why the numbers are higher. Jami Garrison said that the main reason is because of different methodologies, saying the Census Bureau uses building permit data and MAG uses residential completions.

#### 10. Regional Updates

DJ Stapley talked about the technical assistance panels from the Urban Land Institute (ULI). He said that ULI sent experts to work with the town staff to examine the town center area. He said that the town has created a Village Development Committee, which will work on rebranding the town center.

#### 11. Next Meeting of MAG POPTAC

Chair Patrick Banger said that the next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, May 27, 2014 at 10:00 am. The meeting adjourned at 10:53 am.







## Demographics: Sheltered & Unsheltered

## Heat Relief Network 2014

### FAQ's about the Heat Relief Network

Q: What is the Heat Relief Network?

A: The Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) coordinates the Heat Relief Network, a network of service providers, faith-based groups, municipalities, businesses and caring citizens mobilizing to provide hydration and heat refuge for people in need.

In 2013, there were 73 hydration stations and refuge locations throughout the valley. Network participants provide water and refuge for people needing heat relief.

Homeless Shelters are full and sadly have to turn people away. The network offers a place for people to go who would otherwise be on the streets.

Network participants can serve as a collection point for water bottle and basic needs donations. In 2013, there were 66 water collection points in the valley. The network is voluntary and open to any agency or organization wanting to join.

The ultimate goal of the Heat Relief Network is to prevent heat-related deaths.

Q: Why is the Heat Relief Network Important?

A: A number of heat-related deaths during the summer months tragically underscore the importance of recognizing the dangers of extreme heat.

July is typically the most deadly month in Arizona when it comes to heat caused deaths.

The high daytime temperatures coupled with the high nighttime temperatures makes this time of year very dangerous. The high night temperatures do not allow for the body to cool down and can result in more people being at risk.

According to the National Weather Service, the Phoenix area averages 110 days of temperatures above 100 degrees. It is important to protect yourself from the dangers of heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

Prolonged exposed to heat can affect anyone. Even healthy people should take precautions during extremely high temperatures.

Vulnerable populations like older adults, children, people who are experiencing homelessness and those who work outdoors, need to take extra precautions.

Q: What is being done to educate the public on the dangers of the heat and provide heat relief?

A: MAG has partnered with non-profit organizations, the faith-based community, cities and towns in the region, and others to educate the public on the dangers of the heat and provide heat relief maps.

Two maps will be created to indicate heat relief resources available in the community. The *collection map* provides regional locations that are collecting bottled water and other donations such as clothing, unopened sun block, and food items for those who are in need. The *hydration and refuge map* indicates regional locations that people can go to for water, refuge or both. The maps will be available on MAG's Website at [www.azmag.gov](http://www.azmag.gov).

Q: Where are the maps being distributed?

A: Heat Relief Maps will be distributed at public libraries, family service centers, food banks, shelters, municipalities, emergency rooms throughout the region, and by emergency responders.

Q: What are some important tips to avoid heat-related illness?

A: Some tips to avoid heat-related illness are:

- ✓ Increase fluid intake, regardless of activity level. Staying hydrated is extremely important.
- ✓ Limit exercise or outdoor activity between the hours of 11am and 3pm.
- ✓ When outdoors, wear a sunscreen with a minimum SPF 15 and re-apply often. Wear a hat, lightweight clothing and sunglasses.
- ✓ Rest frequently in shady or cool areas to give the body's temperature has a chance to recover and cool down.
- ✓ Never leave infants, children or pets inside a parked vehicle.
- ✓ Check on elderly neighbors to make sure their air conditioning is working and in use. Take advantage of free air-conditioning by visiting locations like shopping malls, the library or other heat refuge locations provided on the map.
- ✓ For other tips to stay safe and hydrated in the summer heat, go to the MAG Website at [www.azmag.gov](http://www.azmag.gov) .

Q: What can people do if they want to help?

A: Donations of bottled water are needed. If you would like to contribute bottled water to the Heat Relief Network, you can donate to any of the regional collection sites listed on the collection map.

Never leave children or pets inside a parked vehicle.

Help to educate your friends and neighbors on the dangers of extreme heat.

Check on your elderly neighbors to ensure they are staying cool.




