The City of Buckeye would like to procure and install bicycle lockers (BikeLid www.bikelid.com) at the existing East Buckeye Park and Ride located on Jackrabbit Trail north of McDowell Road. The secured bicycle lockers would allow local area residents to ride a bicycle to the park-n-ride and store their bicycle within a secure device.

City of Buckeye staff would install the bicycle lockers per the manufacturer's directions at a location determined by City and Valley Metro staff during a field review of the site.

Funding for the local match is intended to come from Buckeye's allotment of Arizona Lottery Funds (ALF) which the City has already obtained.






Council to take action to allow staff to submit two project applications to Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) Avondale-Goodyear Urbanized Area (Avondale-Goodyear UZA).

RELEVANT GOALS:

GOAL 3: A Well-Planned Urban Community

SUMMARY

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

These grant applications through MAG Avondale-Goodyear UZA are intended for design costs for the completion of the East Buckeye Park and Ride in the amount of \$250,000 with a 20 percent local match (\$50,000) and for Transit Security Funds and bicycle security enhancements in the amount of \$37,500 with a 20 percent (\$7,500) local match. The project applications to MAG for the Avondale UZA funding is due April 4th.

BENEFITS:

The opportunity for significant capital improvements to the City's transit facilities without any cost to the General Fund. These improvements provide a regional benefit since the users of these facilities extend across the county.

On March 6, 2019, MAG sent a call for projects within the Avondale-Goodyear UZA. The attached exhibit shows a small part of Buckeye that falls within the Avondale-Goodyear UZA boundary. In order to apply for any UZA funding, a municipality must have a completed Transit Plan that supports the projects within the UZA. On November 28, 2016, the City adopted the Buckeye Transit Plan "for the purpose of developing a local transit plan to guide the implementation of transit services and capital investments." This plan along with staff's recent presentation to MAG has enabled the City to be fully eligible and selected for these two grants.

These grant applications through MAG Avondale-Goodyear UZA are intended for design costs for the expansion of 250 additional parking spaces. The additional covered parking area of the East Buckeye Park and Ride will be in the amount of \$250,000 with a 20 percent local match (\$50,000). The Transit Security Funds and bicycle security enhancements will be in the amount of \$37,500 with a 20 percent (\$7,000) local match. Funding for the local match is intended to come from Buckeye's allotment of Arizona Lottery Funds (ALF) which the City has already obtained. Project applications to MAG for the Avondale UZA funding is due April 4th and funding of this grant will be completed by the end of June with commencement of the projects beginning on July 1, 2019.

Starting in FY19/20, the intent has been to have the East Buckeye Park and Ride (PNR) Improvements in the Capital Improvement Plan. The City would need to make this project a priority to receive the design cost funding for the PNR and for construction of new bicycle security devices at the PNR.

FUTURE ACTION: Council and staff; does this need to be communicated internally/externally?

No future action for this fiscal year will be required, however, this is intended to be a multi-year project with future construction of additional capital projects. Future funding opportunities will be made available through the Avondale-Goodyear UZA, and during this current year's process, Buckeye has already been selected as a priority for future funding through MAG.

Funding for the local match is intended to come from Buckeye's allotment of ALF. Therefore, no money from the General Fund is intended for use of these projects.

Summary:

Cancer is one of the biggest killers of firefighters today. Each time a firefighter responds to a fire, he or she is exposed to many cancer causing compounds that are produced and released by burning materials. It is the goal of BFMRD to help reduce our member's exposure to these harmful compounds. As an organization, we have taken steps to help protect our members by purchasing state of the art equipment and providing them with the best possible personal protection equipment. One of the areas we need assistance in is the decontamination of firefighters during and after a fire, prior to leaving the scene. This grant request is for \$11,722.67 for the on-scene decontamination equipment to be used by crew members while still on-scene of a fire response.



About the U.S. Census Bureau's 2013-2017 American Community Survey 5 year Estimates


The American Community Survey (ACS) is a nationwide survey that uses continuous, multi-year sampling to produce estimates for a variety of geographical areas, the smallest being the Census Block Group. MAG uses the 5-year estimates because they provide increased statistical reliability for less populated areas and small population groups. ACS is a sample, meaning that it is not a full census of the population. For the 5 year estimates, surveys are collected from a sample population over the 5 year period. These surveys are then used to create estimates for the whole population. And, because it is an estimate of the whole population, there is a degree of uncertainty in the results. This degree of uncertainty is reflected in the margins of error that are calculated and reported along with the results of the survey. The margins of error are calculated at the 90 percent confidence level, meaning that users of the data can be 90 percent confident that the range reflected in the margin of error contains the true value. The margins of error are not reported on this web site, but are available from the Census at <http://factfinder.census.gov/> or are available upon request from MAG. 




Ability to Speak English / Veterans Status by Age




















